
NZILA___FIRTH CONFERENCE 2023



10.50am Jala Makhzoumi	Nature, Environment and Heritage: Landscape Architecture Approach to Sustainable Urban Growth Unlike larger cities, the landscape of provincial towns continues to manifest the lived in, mutually constitutive relationship people have with their natural environment. The urban morphology, aggregate features and their associated socio-cultural practices account, in large part, for these towns' urban distinctiveness and attractiveness. The threat comes from unregulated urban growth and development that fails to recognize the environmental, ecological, and cultural value of the urban landscape. A landscape architecture approach to future development has the potential to capitalize on the natural and cultural heritage, safeguard the urban environment and provide for continued quality living. In my talk I will draw on two projects, provincial towns in Lebanon and Iraq, to demonstrate the landscape approach and its contribution to enduring and meaningful futures.
